Der ALL2288 Videoserver/Linux Arm Plattform ist für den gewerblichen Gebrauch als auch für den privaten Gebrauch geeignet. Der ALL2288 ist mit einem vorinstallierten Videoserver der Firma Networkoptix (networkoptix.com) bespielt und dient in erster Instanz zur Darstellung von Videostreams und zur Überwachung von Objekten. Dennoch hat das Gerät auch ein Ubuntu basiertes Linux mit Desktop Oberfläche installiert. D.h. das Gerät ist ebenso in der Lage Linux Programme ausführen zu können. Dieses Gerät entspricht den CE- und FCC-Vorschriften.

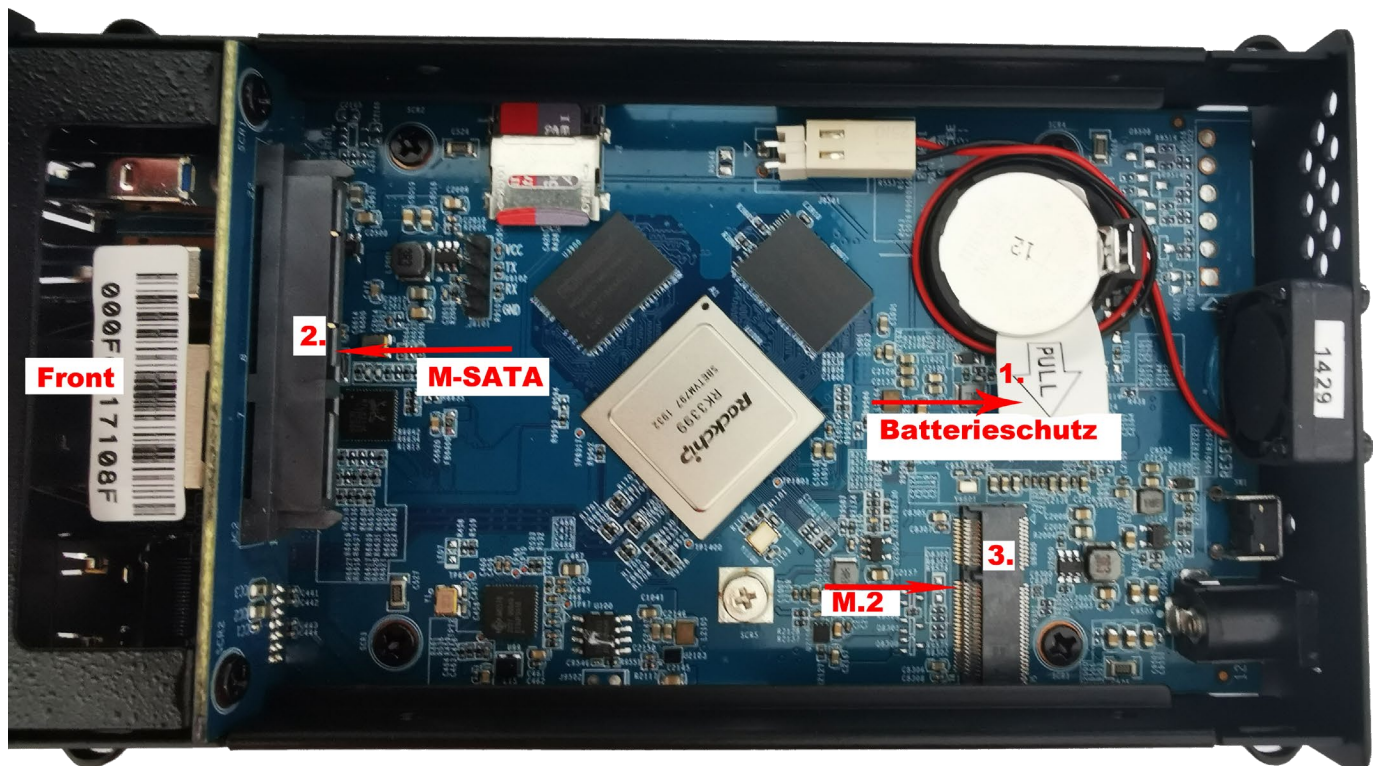

Sehr geehrter Kunde

Dies ist eine Kurzanleitung zur Inbetriebnahme des ALL2288 Videorecorders mit Networkoptix Software. Das Gerät kann aber auch als universelle Server und Linux Appliance genutzt werden. Über den HDMI Anschluss können Sie einen Monitor anschließen, auf welchem Sie einen Debian Desktop zur weiteren Verwendung finden.

Auf diesem Gerät ist der NX Server bereits installiert. Sie müssen diesen lediglich im NX Client Software als Server hinzufügen.





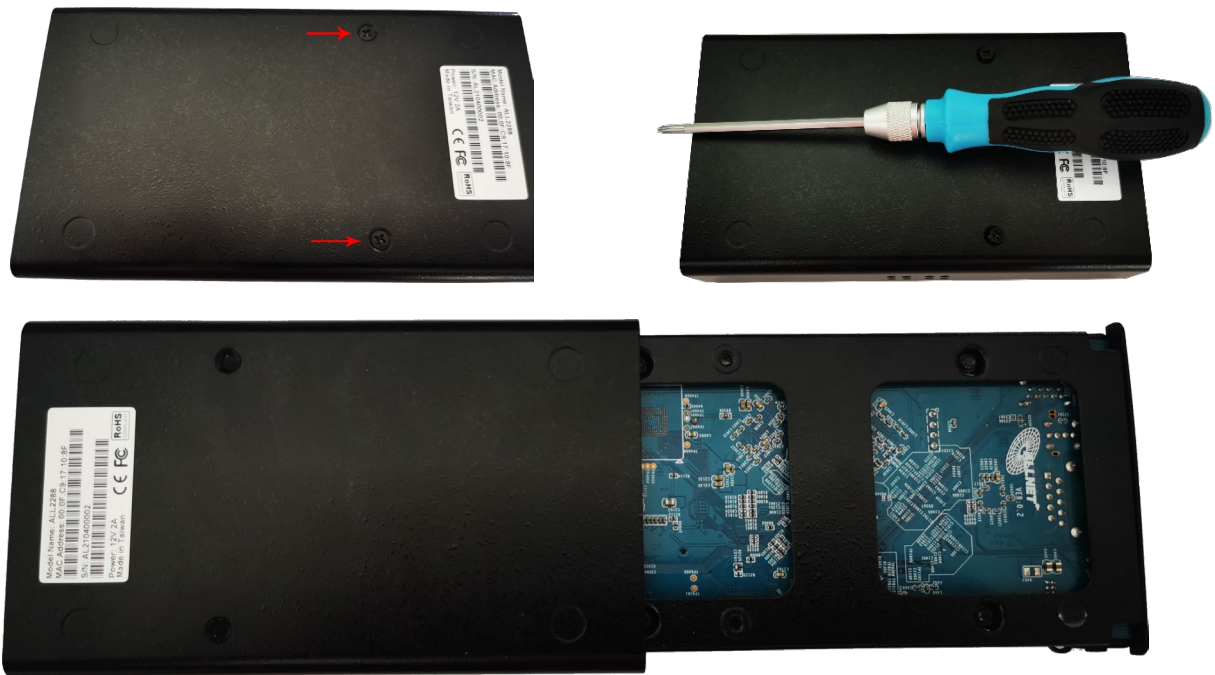
Installation:

1. Festplatten Installation

- Der ALL2288 unterstützt nur 2,5" Zoll AUSSCHLIESSLICH HDD oder Hochwertige SSD's
- Max. Höhe sollte < 9,7mm sein
- **WICHTIG:** Die Festplatte muss vorher formatiert werden! Verwenden Sie hierzu NTFS, FAT32 oder exFAT.

2. Schritt 1: Entfernen des ALL2288 Gehäuses

- Auf der Unterseite des ALL2288 befinden sich zwei Gehäuseschrauben, zum lösen des Metallgehäuses
- Zum Öffnen wird ein Kreuzschlitz-Schraubenzieher benötigt
- Nachdem die Schrauben gelöst wurden, kann das Gehäuse heruntergeschoben werden.



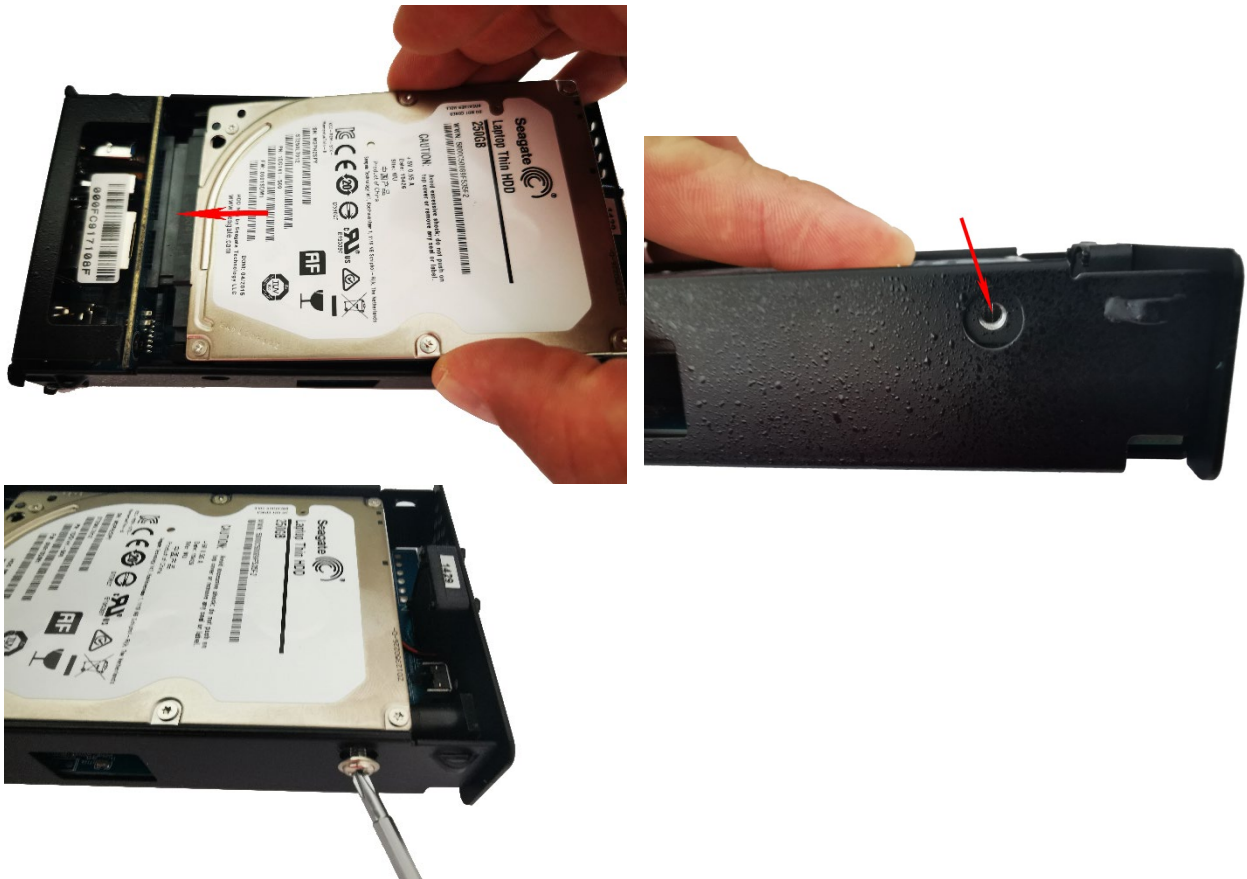
3. Schritt 2: Installation/Montage der Festplatte

- Als Erstes unter 1. Entfernen Sie den Batterieschutz durch herausziehen
- Nehmen Sie eine 2,5 Zoll HDD und schieben Sie sie in Richtung des SATA Konnektors 2. zur Front des ALL2288
- Kontrollieren sie den festen Sitz des Konnektors und die Übereinstimmung der Löcher für die Befestigungsschrauben der HDD an der Seite





- Zur Montage der HDD nutzen Sie bitte die im Lieferumfang enthaltenen M3 Schrauben, welche Sie in einem Plastiktütchen finden.



4. Schritt 3: Gehäuse schließen & Montageplatte installieren

- Bitte schieben Sie nun den Innenteil des ALL2288 wieder zurück ins Gehäuse und achten Sie auf die Übereinstimmung der Montagelöcher
- Wenn Sie die beiliegende Montageplatte benötigen, können Sie diese gleich befestigen in dem Sie die längeren M3 Flachkopfschrauben verwenden.
- Legen Sie Platte so auf, so dass sie plan auf dem Gehäuse liegt. Die Montagelöcher müssen mit dem Gehäuse übereinstimmen. Drehen Sie nun die Schrauben ein und ziehen Sie sie handfest an.
- Sollten Sie diese Platte nicht benötigen, nutzen Sie die originalen schwarzen Senkkopfschrauben zum Verschließen





5. Anschalten des ALL2288
 - Bitte schließen Sie das beiliegende Netzteil an den ALL2288 an. Nutzen Sie niemals ein anderes Netzteil ohne mit unserem Support gesprochen zu haben.
 - Der ALL2288 bootet automatisch und besitzt keinen Netzschalter
 - Schließen Sie ein RJ45 Kabel an die RJ45 Buchse an, und verbinden Sie dieses mit Ihrem Netzwerk/Router

6. Networkoptix Server und Client
 - Der ALL2288 ist ein reiner NX Server. Diesen können Sie nach der Installation dem Start zur Seite legen. **Die automatische Installationsroutine benötigt ca 10-15 Minuten.**
 - Den Server finden Sie, wenn Sie einen NX Client aufrufen. Dieser muss mit dem gleichen Netzwerk verbunden sein, wie der NX Server.

- Das Display startet nicht: Bitte überprüfen Sie die Stromversorgung. Steckt das Kabel des Netzteils richtig im Gerät? Überprüfen Sie bitte auch den Kaltgerätestecker im Netzteil. Bei der Stromversorgung über PoE (Power over Ethernet): Bitte kontrollieren Sie den RJ45 Stecker ob er richtig eingeklickt ist. Das Kabel sollte mindestens Cat5e für Displays bis 15 Zoll und Cat6 für Displays ab 15 Zoll entsprechen um die Leistung zu übertragen. Kontrollieren Sie bitte ob der Switch genügend Leistung zur Verfügung stellt und ob das Display an einem PoE Port angeschlossen ist. Nur Standard konformes PoE darf verwendet werden. Bei passivem PoE kann ihr Display zerstört werden. Hierfür wird keine Garantie übernommen.
- Ich bekomme keine Ethernet/ Internet Verbindung: Bitte schalten Sie das WLAN aus. Schalten Sie die Ethernet Verbindung aus und wieder an und kontrollieren Sie die IP Adress-Einstellungen, ob sie eine statische IP eingestellt haben. Die Wlan Verbindung und Bluetooth sollten bei Nichtbenutzung immer auf deaktiviert stehen um Probleme zu vermeiden.
